



#### **RENEWAL OF TOPS TAX**

A Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Department highlight from that same election cycle included our voters' emphatic support for the popular Trails, Open Space and Parks (TOPS) sales tax program. Our voters supported, by a seventy eight percent majority, a twenty-year extension of this dedicated sales tax for our trails, open spaces, and parks! In May of 2023, the TOPS program was able to add over 1,000 acres of beautiful open space on the eastern edge of the City. Initially marketed for development as "Wild Horse Ranch", The Conservation Fund partnered with the City to conserve this unique property. Now it will be a community treasure with its beautiful pond, resident blue heron, and breathtaking views of majestic Pikes Peak. For these opportunities and this impactful partnership, I am also very grateful.

#### **FACILITIES AND PROGRAMS**

Turning to facilities and programs, I am also excited to recognize the one-year anniversary of our resumption of operations at the Westside Community Center! Our dedicated staff and community members united to contribute their time, care, and attention to hiring staff, providing programming, and successfully operating this gem within our community. Additionally, I celebrate that our inspiring Therapeutic Recreation Program now has a home base to serve our community at this facility.

### **CELEBRATING TOPS FOR ANOTHER 20 YEARS!**

Colorado Springs residents have reason to celebrate as the Trails, Open Space and Parks (TOPS) program will continue to conserve the city's natural treasures for another 20 years. This success is a testament to the dedication and support of the community, as well as the collaborative efforts of various organizations and governmental bodies.

Leading the charge in renewing the TOPS dedicated sales tax was the Colorado Springs Mayor's Office, whose proactive leadership ensured the measure made it to the ballot. Additionally, the unanimous support of the Colorado Springs City Council played a crucial role in securing the program's future.

Two nationally recognized organizations, Trust for Public Land (TPL) and The Conservation Fund (TCF), also deserve recognition for their significant contributions. TPL has been a longstanding partner of the TOPS program, providing expertise and funding for key conservation projects such as the acquisition of Red Rock Canyon Open Space and renovations to Panorama Park. Likewise, TCF's financial assistance and staff support have been instrumental in acquiring important open spaces including Fishers Canyon Open Space and Blodgett Open Space, as well as the recent addition of Wild Horse Ranch.

Local advocacy groups, notably the Trails and Open Space Coalition (TOSC), played a vital role in rallying community support for TOPS through advocacy and education initiatives. Their efforts were crucial in garnering widespread support for the program's renewal with almost 80% of voters supporting the extension.

The success of the TOPS renewal is a testament to the community's dedication to preserving and enhancing Colorado Springs' parks, trails, and open spaces. Another 20 years will help the department continue to build a sustainable park system that benefits the community today and far into the future.



#### WILD HORSE RANCH OPEN SPACE ACRES: +1,018

On March 14, 2023, City Council unanimously approved the expansion of the TOPS Program open space network. This expansion involved adding the Wild Horse Ranch property, which was swiftly acquired from The Conservation Fund and finalized in May 2023. This property is situated within the Corral Bluffs Candidate Open Space area on the east side of the city, directly south of State Highway 94 near South Franceville Coal Mine Road. Identified as a valuable area in the 2014 Park System Master Plan, it offers scenic views of Pikes Peak and facilitates crucial connections between various open spaces, including Corral Bluffs and Bluestem Prairie.

#### **KETTLE CREEK OPEN SPACE** ACRES: +352

Four land parcels were donated, marking the largest private contribution and the introduction of the first northeast properties to the TOPS program. The largest parcel, spanning 186.6 acres near Powers Blvd. and Interquest Pkwy., is designated as Kettle Creek Open Space. Conservation efforts take precedence, with an environmental assessment in the works to potentially facilitate future trail development. Recognized in the 2014 Park System Master Plan as a vital natural resource, the donated land also serves as habitat for the threatened Preble's Meadow Jumping Mouse, highlighting its ecological importance and the imperative for meticulous conservation measures.



#### **CORRAL BLUFFS ADDITION** ACRES: +5.74

The strategic acquisition of an inholding at Corral Bluffs Open Space represents a significant achievement for the TOPS Program. TOPS began pursuing the parcel in 2010, securing a right of first refusal. Originally part of the larger Anderson Property, the parcel's acquisition furthers TOPS' mission of preserving natural landscapes. It benefits from exclusive access through the Corral Bluffs entrance at Davis and Hoofbeat Roads.

### WHAT IS TOPS?

Trails, Open Spaces and Parks (TOPS) is a City sales tax program that has played a vital role in the construction, protection and preservation of city trails, open spaces and parks since it was first approved by Colorado Springs voters in April 1997. In April 2023, Colorado Springs citizens voted yes on Ballot Issue 1 to extend the TOPS sales and use tax until 2043. This dedicated sales tax generates approximately \$12 million annually.



#### CITY RESUMES OPERATIONS OF WESTSIDE COMMUNITY CENTER

On June 1, 2022, the Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Services Department resumed operation of the Westside Community Center (WCC) using the Public Private Partnership (P3) model. This approach involves city staff and finances to run the center and establishes a community-based advisory committee. Unlike other department centers, a unique process was created to bring in tenants for leasable space and contract service providers offering programs, in addition to limited offerings from the facility program staff.

To return the center to City operation, several facility updates were needed. Funds from the Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) were earmarked for several projects at the center, including an assessment of the utility tunnels network, new HVAC system and new roof and gutters on all three buildings, totaling nearly \$1.4 million for all three projects. Additional needed projects were funded by the city and included extending the city's IT network to the campus, installing security cameras around the campus, sidewalk leveling, and rekeying the campus buildings.

#### WESTSIDE WORKING COMMITTEE

In the fall of 2022, the Westside Community Center Working Committee, a working body of the Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Advisory Board, began meeting. The 10-member Working Committee, representing the wants and needs of the westside community, reviews proposals for prospective tenant and program/ service providers at the center, making recommendations to the city for implementation. Selection criteria include that the tenant or program/service provider aligns with the center's mission and vision, is representative of the westside community, and brings service and value to that same community.

#### **TENANTS AND COMMUNITY PARTNERS**

Starting in the fall of 2022, continuing through 2023 to present day, the center has flourished. Three previous tenants and five new tenants have signed new lease agreements to rent space in one of the three buildings on the campus. In addition to tenants, staff at the center have worked to bring in new program and service providers from the community. The center has also expanded operating hours, remaining open into the evenings and on the weekends for programs and rentals, to further serve the needs of the community.

These new and returning tenants and programs are partners in providing the westside community with in-demand programs and services in their neighborhood. While the full list of these partners is extensive, key partnerships include the African American Historical and Genealogical Society of Colorado Springs, Funky Little Theater Company, Westside Cares Community food pantry, Visiting Nurse Association Foot Care Clinic, United Hearts Community School, YMCA of the Pikes Peak Region, Modern Yoga, and RunMental. Programs include paint classes, fitness and exercise classes, pickleball and table tennis gym time, Zumba, youth dance programs, piano lessons, and even tutoring. All these organizations and providers serve the wants and needs of the westside community and form a mutually beneficial relationship with the City.

Garden of the Gods, a renowned tourist destination, attracts millions of visitors annually and is consistently ranked among the top ten places to visit in the United States by tourism blogs and travel planning websites. Spanning 1,367 acres, the park features stunning red rock formations, miles of hiking trails, and a wheelchair-accessible paved trail. As a captivating natural asset to Colorado Springs, the park is free for both locals and visitors.

## WATER CONSERVATION

Water conservation efforts and innovative solutions are vital to the Colorado Springs Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Department's sustainable management of natural resources and environmental preservation for future generations.

The department achieved a budget surplus of \$1,426,960 through water-saving initiatives, including the installation of new irrigation systems and turf conversions at multiple locations across the city, in addition to receiving record-breaking rainfall in 2023. By meticulously collecting and analyzing weather data throughout the irrigation season, such as precipitation from strategic locations and evapotranspiration rates from smart controllers, the department was able to strategically manage supplemental irrigation needs. The unwavering commitment to sustainability motivates the Colorado Springs Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Department to continue implementing eco-friendly options and adapting to the unique factors influencing each maintenance district's water usage, thereby securing a greener future for our community.

#### **WOODSTONE PARK**

In 2023, the Colorado Springs Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Services Department undertook an eight-week initiative at Woodstone Park, demonstrating a commitment to environmental stewardship. This project involved transitioning the park's landscaping (1.84 acres) from Kentucky bluegrass to a locally adapted, sustainable native grass variety known as blue grama. Carefully selected for its low growth profile, drought-resistance, and suitability to the warmseason climate, blue grama not only maintained an aesthetically pleasing landscape but also represented a significant step towards sustainability.

### ANNUAL WATER CONSERVATION: 700,000 GALLONS

#### SOUTH MONUMENT VALLEY PARK

Based on the 2020 Infrastructure Assessment, more than 55% of the irrigation systems within the Colorado Springs Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Services Department are over 30 years old. As part of the initiative to modernize these systems, the irrigation system in South Monument Valley Park was replaced. The site now features a new Smart controller, leak detection device, and high-efficiency sprinkler heads. Notably, it is one of the few sites that employ non-potable water for irrigation, resulting in cost savings compared to potable water and the elimination of daily service fees.

#### MEMORIAL PARK BEACH HOUSE


In 2023, the Park Maintenance and Operations Division, in collaboration with local landscape contractors, finished installing a new irrigation system at the Memorial Park Beach House. Emphasizing conservation, the last phase involved reseeding the area north of the historic Beach House with a drought-tolerant, coolseason native grass mix. This mix was applied using hydromulch to prevent soil erosion and enhance seed germination.

### FUNDS OVERSEEN BY THE DEPARTMENT

#### TRAILS, OPEN SPACE AND PARKS (TOPS)

TOPS funds are generated from a 0.1% sales and use tax adopted by voters in 1997. In April 2023, Colorado Springs citizens voted to extend TOPS sales and use tax for another 20 years with no increase to the tax. Funds are allocated as follows: 3% TOPS administration, 6% maintenance of TOPS properties, and the balance is designated for open space purchases and stewardship (min. of 60%); new trails (max. of 20%); and park maintenance and development (max. of 20%). A minimum of 75% of Open Space funds must be used for acquisition and 25% used for stewardship.

#### CONSERVATION TRUST FUND (CTF)

Local governments receive 40% of the total revenue generated by the State Lottery, with our city share distributed based on population.

Conservation Trust Fund dollars can be used for the acquisition, development, and maintenance of new conservation sites and for capital improvements or maintenance for recreational purposes on any public site.

#### **ENTERPRISES**

Enterprises enable the city to offer numerous cost-effective services since they are predominantly supported by user fees and do not receive support from the General Fund.

Enterprises include Patty Jewett and Valley Hi Golf Courses, Evergreen and Fairview Cemeteries, and Pikes Peak – America's Mountain in partnership with the US Forest Service.

#### SPECIAL IMPROVEMENT MAINTENANCE DISTRICTS (SIMD)

Assessments against real properties within established districts provide for maintenance of specific improvements in these areas.

SIMD areas include Norwood, Old Colorado City, Platte Avenue, Colorado Avenue, Gateway, Woodstone, Stetson Hills, and Briargate.






#### WELCOME URBAN RANGER TEAM!

The Urban Trail Rangers program bolsters safety and enhances recreational experiences along the city's urban trail system. The program reflects the city's ongoing dedication to public safety and the provision of secure recreational opportunities for its residents. Beginning in 2023, the urban trail rangers began patrolling the trails, fostering an inviting atmosphere while collaborating with community partners and public safety to address safety concerns. Their presence aims to ensure that the trails remain accessible and enjoyable for all users.

#### FUNDING:

The program, funded by City Council in 2023 with \$446,000 from the city's General Fund, supports four staff members and two vehicles.



#### MEMORIAL PARK SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS

In partnership with the Colorado Springs Police Department and the Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Services Department, along with input from residents and the Hillside Advisory Team (HAT), a comprehensive plan addressing safety concerns at Memorial Park was developed. Top priorities identified by HAT include lighting, vandalism, and criminal activity.

#### FUNDING:

The Colorado Springs Police Department secured a \$1,726,331 grant from the Colorado Division of Criminal Justice. This project utilized Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CEPTD) principles to bolster park safety.

#### **KEY IMPROVEMENTS:**

- Installation of 19 gates to restrict nighttime vehicle access.
- Implementation of ten 24-hour video surveillance cameras at strategic locations.
- Enhancement of visibility with the addition of 181 new or improved lights on roadways, parking lots, and walkways.



#### PLAY GOS AT PANORAMA PARK

In 2021, the Colorado Springs Police Department introduced the "Play COS" program, designed to foster positive interactions between officers and community members in Colorado Springs. In collaboration with the Colorado Springs Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Services Department, the program organizes sports-focused events where officers engage with the community through athletic and recreational activities. In 2023, the Play COS event took place at the recently renovated Panorama Park, featuring the donation of sports balls and soccer matches with children from various neighborhoods across the city.
